TAKING UP THE CROSS.

The Ordination of a Priest—Rev. T. L. Rabenstein Enters the Catholic Ministry.

One of the few opportunities for witnessing an event out of the usual order was to-day presented to a reporter, and he made haste to take advantage of it. Through the courtesy of Dr. Otto Zardetti, vicar general of the Catholic diocese of south Dakota, the reporter was permitted to witness the imposing ceremony of ordaining a priest, or the imposition of hands, according to the vernacular of ecclesiastics.

This event occurred at 8 a. m. to-day in the chapel of the Episcopal residence on Mount Marty, and was characterized as the second official act of Rt. Rev. Martin Marty since the fracture of the arm which that gentleman sustained some months ago. It was attended by impressive pomp and ceremony and was suggestive in no small degree of the responsibilities which a man assumes when he enters the army of toilers for the salvation of mankind. The event occurring early in the day, suggests the idea that with the beginning of a day this man begins a new life, and although the heavens were overcast with clouds, it is not to be presumed that the whole future of this laborer in the cause of Christianity will have aught but sunshine and finally a just reward.

The ordination of a deacon, the rite by which he is ushered into the order of priesthood, comes after the deacon has employed years in the study of theology, these years being followed by a long term of attendance upon a school for the education of aspirants to the priesthood. It is the final bestowal of authority from the church and its vestments clothe a candidate with a new dignity and greater responsibilities. It can only occur during the celebration of mass, and consequently it is attended with the ceremony of one of the most sacred services of the Catholic church. To the onlooker, much of the ceremony might seem superfluous, but the ordaining of a deacon is looked upon as a most important event by the church. The act of ordaining is simplicity itself, the only demonstration being the laying of the hands of the bishop upon the bare head of the candidate, and at the same time imploring divine blessing. But by way of approaching this imposition of hands, which is the most essential of all the demonstrations, there comes first a recital of the litany and the imploring of blessing upon the ordination. Then the imposition of hands occurs, it being followed by the investing of the now partially created priest with the insignia of his office. Then his hands are anointed and then the chalice is given into the hands of the now full fledged divine. By this anointing, or unction, of hands the priest is vested with power for the absolution of sins and after that ceremony a portion of his regalia which has heretofore remained unseen is exposed and he is then clothed with all the authority of the office of a priest. After this he is instructed by the bishop as to his duties, takes holy communion and is ready to be congratulated. The ceremony, is very interesting and impressive and is worth a longer walk than from the city to the scene of this morning's observance.

Bishop Marty was assisted in the ordination of Father Thomas L. Rabenstein, by Dr. Otto Zardetti, Father Thomas A. Bety (of Tabor), Father J. F. Hogan (of Centerville) and Father J. A. Stephan (of Ipswich). Father A. O'Hara acted as master of ceremonies. The bishop appeared in the full robes of his office, while the others wore the dress of their respective positions. The prayers and scriptural readings were in Latin, and the officiating clergy in robes when occupying their positions in front of the altar presented a picture full of interest. Thomas L. Rabenstein, who was ordained, is a Bohemian by birth, was educated in America and is in every way fitted to assume the duties of a priest. For a year past he has been a student under the charge of Dr. Zardetti, who is greatly interested in the young man because of his many good qualities. Father Rabenstein's parents reside in Yankton county, and at the ceremony this morning, the mother plainly exhibited the enjoyment which the occasion had for her. The friends of Father Rabenstein presented him with several testimonials of their regard, among which were a gold vessel for carrying anointed oil to sick parishioners, a silk embroidered scarf, for use in the pulpit and a serviceable and handsome gold watch from friends in Tabor. Father Rabenstein has been assigned to the parish at Tabor, Dakota, to which place he went to-day. On Thursday he will officiate at the celebration of high mass and in conducting it he will be assisted by a number of his brother divines.

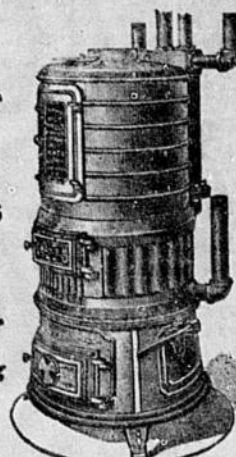
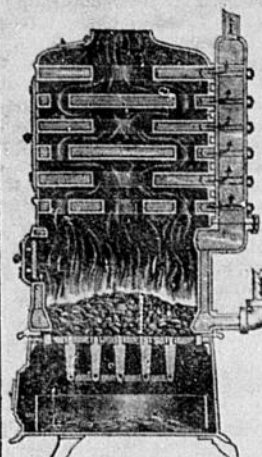
