he Ordination of a Priest-Rev. T. L. Rabsteinek Enters the Catholic Min

One of the few opportunities for witessing an event out of the usual order vas to-day presented to a reporter, and he made haste to take advantage of it. Through the courtesy of Dr. Otto Zardetti, vicar general of the Catholic diocese of south Dakota, the reporter was permitted to witness the imposing ceremony of ordaining a priest, or the inposition of hands, according to the vernacular of ecclesiastics.

This event occured at 8 a. m. to day in the chanel of the Episcopal residence on Mount Marty, and was characterized as the second official act of Rt. Rev. Martin Marty since the fracture of the arm which that gentleman sustained some months ago. It was attended by impressive pomp and ceremony and was suggestive in no small degree of the responsibilities which a man assumes when this he is instructed by the bishop as to he enters the army of toilers for the salvation of mankind. The event occurring early in the day, suggests the idea that with the beginning of a day this man begins a new life, and although the heavens were overcast with clouds, it is not to be presumed that the whole future of this laborer in the cause of christianity will have aught but sunshine and finally a just reward.

The ordination of a deacon, the rite by which he is ushered into the order of priesthood, comes after the descon has employed years in the study of theology, these years being followed by a long term of attendance upon a school for the education of aspirants to the priesthood It is the final bestowal of authority from the church and its vestments clothe a candidate with a new dignity and greater responsibilities. It can only occur during the celebration of mass, and consequently it is attended with the ceremony of one of the most sacred services of the Catholic church. 
