Please note: The following article is from the May 12, 1910 issue of the "Deschuter Herold" newspaper. This German-language newspaper was published in Sioux Falls, SD.

Peter had died in 1905 at his house in Yankton. Theresia died in 1913.

The large residential building in Huber¹, which is well-known throughout the area, recently burned down. The house has stood on the banks of the James River for 40 years and the older fiddlers in particular will remember the unlimited hospitality shown to it in previous years by the late Peter Huber.

The tenants of the farm, Charles Calloway and his family, and Joe Johnson lived in the house, as well as farm hand Frank Babbitt and his family. People were eating supper when the fire broke out upstairs and spread so quickly that little was saved.

Part of the house had been built of solid oak logs 40 years earlier and these fed the flames for hours on end. The fire was probably caused by a defective chimney. The house had seven large rooms and was valued at \$2500 insurance.
