Industry and good farming brought success to Mr. Wagner and a pleasing and helpful personality brought him many friends. Ms. Wagner survives her husband, as do three children, Charles who resides on the old family farm; Mrs. Anna Willman of this county, and Albert of Alpena, S.D. The deceased is also survived by two brothers, Louis, of Yankton, and Constant, of Utica.
