A SABBATH FATALITY.

Paul Muller, a Young Man, loses his life in the James river.

Yesterday afternoon while the people of this city were sitting quietly in the shade and calmly thinking over the words of grace which had been uttered for their benefit in the churches in the forenoon, a death struggle was being enacted at a place in this county about twenty miles north of Yankton, which filled the hearts of strong men with horror and in consequence of which a whole family is to-day plunged in mourning.

A party of young men, all of them robust and full of animation, were at Peter Huber's on the James river engaged in fishing in that stream with a seine. The party contained, among others, Paul Muller, Fred Netb, Sigmund Jaeger, of Yankton, Peter Huber, Jr., and Frank Huber. This party was divided into two squads, one on each side of the river. They had dragged the seine several times up and down stream, but without making a catch and had been forward and back across the river at least five times. One of the party was finally sent up river some distance to walk down stream in order to drive the fish into the seine and the others proceeded to fix the seine for the catch. Upon the east side of the river stood Fred Netb and Peter Huber, Jr., holding one end of the seine rope. Upon the west side were Paul Muller, Sigmund Jaeger and the Huber brothers. Peter Huber took an end of the rope and started across to the east side, the river being about sixty feet wide. He accomplished about one-half of the distance when he slipped and fell into the water. Boiled Babies.

San Francisco, July 27.-The steamship City of Peking has arrived from Hong Kong and Yokohama. At Seoul, Corea, some evilly disposed Chinese spread the report that American missionaries in the country had purchased a number of Korean children, and after killing them, had boiled them down for medicines. This aroused the popular feeling and caused the authorities to take steps to preserve the lives of the missionaries and place them in safety. The people next seized nine Korean officials who were said to have been parties to the sale of the children to missionaries, and then put them to death by decapitation in the public streets.

In the meantime foreign residents at Seoul telegraphed to Chemulpo to the commanders of the American, French, Russian, Japanese and Chinese men-of-war for assistance. There were one American man-of-war, the Essex, the Palau having just left, one Frenchman, the Aspio, one Russian cruiser, two Japanese and one Chinese war vessel in port at the time. At 10 o'clock on the night of the 19th inst., the Essex, Aspio and Russian vessels sent about thirty men each, who started in separate bodies to Seoul to protect their nationalities there. Prior to this the Korean authorities sent small bodies of troops to guard the foreign consulates.
