COMMISSIONER PROCEEDINGS.

The Vote Canvassed and Result Declared.
Office of the Board of County Commissioners, Yankton County, S. D., Saturday, Nov. 8th, 1890.—Board met in pursuance to order of adjournment. All members present except Commissioner Chladek.

The canvassing board examined the canvases of the vote during the morning. The following is the vote as canvassed by the board:

FOR CAPITAL.

Pierre had 1,286 votes; Huron had 829 votes.

Shall the word "male" be stricken from Sec. 1, of article 7, of the constitution. No, 1,814 votes; Yes 826 votes.

"For the purposes of defraying extraordinary expenses and making public improvements, or to meet a deficit or failure in revenue, the state may, in addition to pre-existing debts, contract debts never to exceed in the aggregate \$500,000, except to repel invasion, suppress insurrection or defend the state or (the) United States in war." No, 1,891 votes; Yes, 231 votes.

"No Indian who sustains tribal relations, receives support in whole or part from the government of the United States, or holds untaxable land in severalty shall be permitted to vote at any election under this constitution." No, 1,385 votes; Yes, 727 votes.

On motion of E. T. White, county judge, the persons having the highest number of votes for their respective offices were declared elected and the county auditor was instructed to issue them certificates of election.

Moved and seconded that the canvassing board stand adjourned. Carried.

On motion contract was awarded Mike O'Neil for grading road on line between section's 9 and 24, township 94, range 54, at the price of 8 1/2 cents per cubic yard, he to be paid for going and coming.

The board next opened the bids for grading the Rhine bridge near the Wetter place. Following were the bidders:

AT SIOUX FALLS.

A Disagreement Among the Canvassing Board.

Sioux Falls, Nov. 10.—The board of commissioners of this county have got into a quarrel among themselves over the returns from the various portions of the county and they will not be able to complete the returns before to-morrow. The difficulty arises over what shall be done with the returns from four precincts in the city. The poll books from the first, second and fourth wards were enclosed within the ballot box, when they should have been sealed in an envelope separate from the box. The chairman, John McKee, refused to open those boxes and at 11:20 tonight, the commissioners still being in session, the county auditor took the bull by the horns and opened the boxes. The chairman then declared the board of county canvassers adjourned until to-morrow at 9 o'clock.

For three days the board has been wrangling over these returns and what the result will be cannot be determined. The board stands two republicans and two democrats, the other member being a candidate and cannot participate. If the city returns be thrown out, as the chairman wishes, Carland, democratic candidate for the senate, will be elected. The vote on the capital stands: Pierre, 2,862; Huron, 1,914.

THEY MUST VOTE.

The Women of the State will Continue the Battle for the Ballot.

Huron, Nov. 10.—The executive committee of the South Dakota Equal Suffrage association met here Saturday and settled up the affairs of their late campaign. Bills were settled and everything fixed up satisfactorily by the committee. The association, although obliged to submit to defeat, are surprised that the majority against equal suffrage is not larger. They made a gallant fight and are proud of it. The association was reorganized and will now use every effort possible to secure legislative action looking to the enactment of a law providing for equal suffrage at municipal elections. A plan to secure this will at once be inaugurated and a force of workers put into the field to further the measure. These are the new officers: Mrs. P. E. Johnson, of Highmore, president; Mrs. Sophia Harden, of Huron, vice president; Mrs. Elizabeth Wardall, of Huron, secretary; Mrs. Nettie C. Hall, of Wessington Springs, treasurer. Mrs. J. A. Pickler, of Faulkton, was made a member of the national executive committee and Mrs. S. D. Richards, of Puckwana, with Mrs. Hall and Mrs. Harden, were chosen delegates to the national suffrage convention. Mrs. Emma S. DeVoe was chosen state lecturer and organizer.

Powderly at Denver.

Denver, Nov. 10.—The general assembly of Knights of Labor met this afternoon. There are already in the city 300 delegates, and 100 more are expected to arrive to-morrow morning. To-night Powderly spoke at the coliseum on the subject of "The Labor Situation to-day" before one of the largest and most enthusiastic audiences assembled here for some time.

Allison for Judge.

Washington, Nov. 10.—The report that Secretary Tracey is to go on the supreme bench to succeed the late Justice Miller, and that Representative Henry Clay Evans is to succeed Gen. Tracy, cannot be verified. It is understood that if President Harri-

son elevates any of his cabinet it will be Attorney-General Miller, but it is possible that the new justice will hail from one of the western states, and the name of Senator Allison is alluded to as the most likely.

THE VERY LATEST.

Everything Has Tumbled Our Way.

St. Paul, Nov. 10.—Although Pierre claims to have won the contest for permanent capital in South Dakota by a majority of about 9,000 and many of that city's opponents concede as much, the other contestant for the honor does not yield anything, as is evident from the following Huron special to the Pioneer Press.

"Of senators in the new legislature the republicans have elected enough to give them a majority of three over all opposition in that body, there being twenty-four republicans to twenty-one democrats and independents. In the house there will be a tie vote if the democrats and independents unite against the republicans. There are three contests which are believed to be rather favorable to the republicans. This would give them a majority on joint ballot and insure the election of Senator Moody to succeed himself. Governor Mellette's vote will exceed that of Loucks, independent, by seven thousand, and that of Taylor (dem) by 12,000. It is very probable the capital question will go to the courts for settlement.

Too Many Old Soldiers.

Quincy, Ill., Nov. 10.—The trustees of the Illinois Soldiers' and Sailors' home to-day issued a circular announcing that in consequence of the crowded condition of the home it would be impossible to admit new members until additional accommodations are provided. There are now 1,230 men on the roll, of whom 915 are present and those on furlough are rapidly coming in. The names of applicants hereafter will be registered in order of the dates of their applications and when there is a vacancy the person properly entitled to admission will be notified.
